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A New Year's Message — Chief Mark McCrory

As we begin a new year, I want to reflect on the last. 2023 brought much growth within our agency. New Police Officers, civilians, and volunteers began their journey with our agency. Of course, we also saw a few of our veterans retire.

We instituted new programs, such as TRULEO, an AI software that automatically reviews and analyzes body camera videos to help automate supervision, facilitate coaching, and promote police professionalism. We achieved full certification through the Arizona Law Enforcement Accreditation Program. We hosted three Citizen Police Academies, two City Leadership Academies, three community safety seminars titled Refuse To Be A Victim, and five Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) classes. We began our marketing campaign to fill 10 Police Officer positions granted to us via the U.S. Justice Department's Community Oriented Policing Services program.



We have prioritized community engagement and trust-building. Our officers actively participate in local events, collaborate with residents, and address shared concerns, fostering strong relationships within our community.

Education is a cornerstone of their approach. They provide resources on crime prevention, safety measures, and outreach programs, empowering individuals to play an active role in their safety.

Recognizing societal issues contributing to crime, such as mental health challenges and substance abuse, we collaborate with social services, healthcare providers, and community organizations to develop holistic approaches to address these underlying problems. Investment in community programs is pivotal for redirecting youth energy away from crime and fostering positive relationships between law enforcement and the next generation.

CGPD ensures transparency in operations, fair policies, and holds officers accountable for their actions. Continuous training on cultural sensitivity equips officers to better serve the diverse communities in Casa Grande.

Overall, the Casa Grande Police Department is committed to creating a cohesive community where trust and cooperation between law enforcement and residents are tangible realities, ensuring a safer and healthier environment for everyone. We look forward to continuing our service to the Casa Grande community!

Welcome Our New Officers



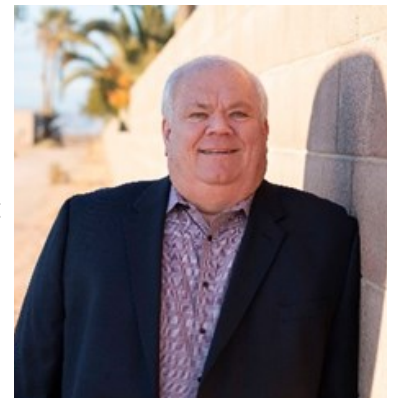

Truleo — Deputy Chief Brian Ramirez

I am excited to announce a significant advancement in our approach to reviewing body-worn camera (BWC) footage. Starting in January 2024, our police department will implement Truleo, an artificial intelligence (AI) review and analytics platform, to

comprehensively analyze 100% of our BWC footage. Recognizing the importance of video reviews in the decision to deploy cameras, we, at CGPD, identified an opportunity for improvement.



Presently, supervisors review approximately 2% of camera footage, just slightly above the 1% national average. These reviews are key in promoting transparency, accountability, and refining our practices. The footage serves as a crucial tool in investigations, aiding us in accurately reconstructing incidents and resolving disputes arising from encounters.

Since October 2021, when we adopted body-worn cameras, we have recorded over 154,345 videos. While this volume underscores the task to review each video, our department has established policies governing when videos are assessed. Currently, supervisors randomly review five selected videos per week using Axon's web-based video management system. However, this method only captures a small percentage of the great work our officers perform.

Truleo is set to address this gap by analyzing officer language, categorizing events, and determining the professionalism of the interaction. It identifies words or phrases associated with uses of force, pursuits, arrests, noncompliance, formality, explanations, gratitude, insults, threats, directed profanity, and more. Importantly, Truleo extends this analysis to citizens interacting with officers. The platform then tags and labels areas of interest, facilitating supervisors' efficiency by directing them to critical points in the video.

To further enhance our understanding of Truleo's impact, we will collaborate with Arizona State University in a research project evaluating its use within our department. For more information on Truleo, please visit their website at:

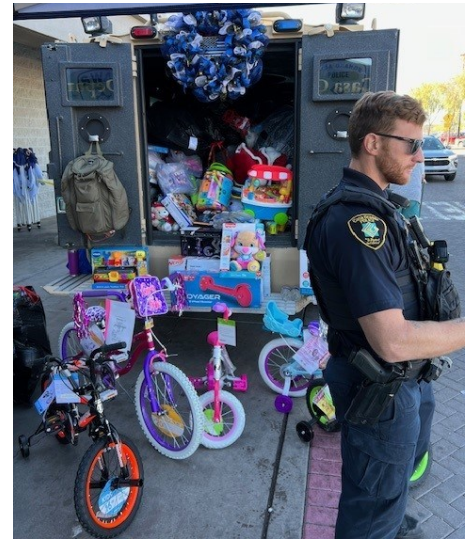
